The present study examined the relationship of depression with family environment among adolescents in Chandigarh. For the collection of data Beck Depression Inventory-II and Family Environment Scale were used. For the analysis of data statistical techniques like t-test, Pearson product moment correlation and stepwise multiple regression were used.

The results of present study demonstrated that depression was significantly and negatively correlated with cohesion, expressiveness, independence and recreational orientation dimensions of family environment. Also, it was observed that expressiveness, cohesion and independence were the significant predictors of depression which demonstrated that high expressiveness, cohesion and independence in the families leads to lower level of depression.

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
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
