

ABSTRACT:

A Jenmi is often termed as a land-lord. Any person, who holds a patta from a collector in a British District and under it holds lands from the British Government subject to Government tax more or less is called a land-lord in ordinary language. Even in Travancore, any coffee planter or indeed any ryot who holded lands under a grant from the Sirkar, etc or might be called a land-lord. But be it remembered, such land-lords were not Jenmis.

INTRODUCTION:
